And the scary part is that Dachau wasn't even close to being the worst. Established as a prison camp for political prisoners near a major city, it was never part of the Holocaust as such. Some inmates were actually
released from Dachau after serving time and being considered sufficiently intimidated. Many people were murdered there, through torture and often random executions, but there is no hard evidence that the gas chamber which was installed was ever used. On the other hand the worst places aren't visible anymore. Hidden in the forests of Poland, the camps at Treblinka, Sobibor, and Belzec weren't really camps at all, but straightforward killing sites. They were constructed specifically for Operation Reinhard, the code-name for the extermination of all Polish Jews, and killed over 2 million Jews by mid-1943. Afterwards, those facilities were razed and an attempt was made to camouflage them. Established as a prison camp for political prisoners near a major city, it was never part of the Holocaust as such. Some inmates were actually released from Dachau after serving time and being considered sufficiently intimidated. Many people were murdered there, through torture and often random executions, but there is no hard evidence that the gas chamber which was installed was ever used. On the other hand the worst places aren't visible anymore. Hidden in the forests of Poland, the camps at Treblinka, Sobibor, and Belzec weren't really camps at all, but straightforward killing sites. They were constructed specifically for Operation Reinhard, the code-name for the extermination of all Polish Jews, and killed over 2 million Jews by mid-1943. Afterwards, those facilities were razed and an attempt was made to camouflage them. Even at a time when the Nazis still thought they could win, this wasn't something they wanted found by the post-war world.
