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Organize your page's content into easily accessible panels with the Spry Tabbed Panels widget. Clicking a tab opens a new panel's worth of information without the browser having to load a new web page. 1. In the document window, click where you wish to insert the panels. You can find all the Spry goodies on the Insert panel's Spry category Figure 132, left; you'll also find several Spry widgets including tabbed panels listed under the Layout category Figure 132, right, and other Spry buttons grouped under other tabs form validation Spry widgets appear under the Forms tab, for example. Note When you save a page after inserting a Spry Tabbed Panel, Dreamweaver notifies you that it has added two files to the site a CSS file SpryTabbedPanels.css for formatting the panel group, and a JavaScript file SpryTabbedPanels.js to make the panels appear and disappear when visitors click the tabs. Dreamweaver saves both files in the SpryAssets folder in your site's root folder. Make sure you upload this folder when you move your site onto your web server. 3. In the Property inspector, name the panel group Figure 133. This step is optional. Dreamweaver provides a generic name

But if you ever take the plunge into manually modifying your Spry widgets in Code view, you may want to change the Spry panel group's name to something more descriptive. If you create a group of tabbed panels to house information about a product, for example, you might name the panel group productPanels. A descriptive name helps you identify code related to the panel group if you work in Code view to enhance or change the functionality of the panels. Figure 133. Normally, when a browser downloads a page containing Spry panels, it highlights the first tab and panel. However, if you'd rather open another panel when the page loads, select the relevant tab's name in the Property inspector's "Default panel" menu. 4. Add additional panels. I am not sure if I would buy another book by this guy. I like his style and attention to detail.but the typos and errata are driving me crazy. Overall. I still feel torn over whether this book is worth what I paid for it.But in

the end I figured why not learn dreamweaver. I bought this book having zero experience with either dreamweaver or web design. I am not particularly good at such things but the Sawyer does an excellent job of explaining things in a way that makes a dry subject a little easier. and was happy with it. Recently, I found myself needing to do some web work and purchased Dreamweaver CS5.5. I also figured I had a lot to learn and relearn so I purchased a few tutorials. The first one I started was this one, The Missing Manual. It started off very well. The author obviously knows his subject well and has the ability to communicate it. I worked through the tutorials in the early chapters and felt I was genuinely learning to use this powerful application. As time went on, however, I felt I was actually learning less and less. The problem, for me, was one of style and method. With technical matters, I learn best by doing. I want the explanation and I want the background but I want them as I progress through actually doing something. That's what made the early chapters go well for me. As concepts were explained, exercises were presented that made them real. That changed.

The further I advanced into the text, the more I found chapters that did nothing but explain. Many chapters have no exercises at all. I felt as if I were drinking the knowledge into my head only to have it leak out again from lack of use. That was frustrating, to say the least. Another problem I had was with the ordering of the material. Some fairly advanced concepts were introduced too early while the simpler ones had to wait for a later chapter. I would have liked to have worked through a series of exercises, each building on previous material, that made me more intimately familiar with the capabilities of the program and competent to use those capabilities. Instead, I found plenty of information, somewhat disjointed and a dearth of actual exercises to actually experience those capabilities. I will hold onto this book. I think it will make a good reference. I need another tutorial, though, to actually learn the program. I didn't care for the visual examples either. I just wanted a simplified version that would be simple enough to follow for my project. I found a better book that did exactly what I needed and it was by the Adobe people who created Dreamweaver, it was simplified and easy to follow. This was the first time I'd used a TMM product and I found it extremely user friendly, well organized and structured, and the tutorials included practical and easy to use and reuse examples as a way to get comfortable with what Dreamweaver is capable of. I hadn't used DW for over a decade so while a few things were still familiar from that far back, much of it was not and the TMM assumed nothing and was perfect as a step-by-step guide on learning the ins and outs of this latest version of Dreamweaver. After spending two weeks reading and working through the tutorials, I was able to completely rebuild my own website using CSS something I had never worked with before and HTML along with advanced Java Spry features without any issues.

Well worth the money and the time it takes to read and work through it. The Advanced sections provide insight into PHP and dynamic database driven websites as well and that provided enough of a touchstone for me to identify what additional information I needed to research and investigate to take advantage of those features and capability as well. There are also tutorials built into each chapter which give you a chance to try out what you've been reading about. The writing is entertaining and not dry to read. I have an older version of Dreamweaver so am not new to the program but wasn't really using it much so pretty much needed to start from scratch. I am also not a professional programmer but do web design for my church so am not a total novice. I would highly recommend this book. The contents page provided is lousy, to say the least. Just the sections are given with the chapters, and not a single chapter states what it is about, only that it is Chapter 1, Chapter 2 and so on. You have to go into each chapter to find out what it is about. For USD25 I expected much more. Sorry I bought this book. This Dreamweaver CS5.5 book was written by someone who never took the time to have plain ordinary people read it and give feedback, and THEN rewrite the book so it CAN be understood by a plain ordinary person. I find a physical book much better than an ebook for learning. The Adobe tutorials on YouTube are very good, however I like the convenience of being able to refer back to a previous sentence, paragraph, page, chapter or topic to refresh my memory. This is much easier with a book. This book is all you need to become an advanced Dreamweaver user, and I highly recommend it. If you are studying for Adobe Certification you might also find Adobe's Classroom in a Book helpful in addition to the Missing Manual, which is

more focused on the requirements of the Adobe examination.

Nearly 1200 pages packed with useful information presented in a clear concise manner seems to give answers to a lot that frustrated me with the DW CIB. One thing is that the instructions and the comments here are arranged as they should be, easy and intuitive to follow. And they seem to cover most of DWs enormous capabilities. The DW CIB is just the opposite, you have to ween out next step buried in a confusing text and missing information. So, at 5 less than the DW CIB, the missing manual is the only sensible choice in all respects. I finally decided to upgrade to Adobe Design Centre CS5.5 and immediately regretted it. The considerable changes to the way Dreamweaver uses CSS left me completely bamboozled and I had a number of sites that I was struggling to maintain with the new software mainly because of my lack of website structure and the enhancements to web design that CS5.5 introduced and sort of assumed the user knew about. It has transformed my website writing from enthusiastic hacker to pretty much a competent coder. I now love cs5.5 and wont hesitate getting more of the Missing Manuals series for other products when I need them. This fills in all the gaps in my knowledge and then some. There are fewer screenshots of the entire document window, showing what the site should look like along the way. The index is exhaustive, Many crossreferences in the text refer to a later page where a more detailed discussion is given. McFarland is clearly a Dreamweaver expert and a very good teacher.
