I bathe him at home once a week and want to start trimming his nails on my own too but frankly it sacred me to death because hes got really long guicks. I decided to buy this and try it out. Once my dog got used to it it took a few tries and lots of treats for him to get comfortable letting me use it on him for all his feet it is SO EASY to use and works amazingly well and FAST. I use it on the high setting and it really isnt very loud at all. It only takes 510 seconds per nail on that setting, at least in my experience. Here are a few tips based on my trial and error It came in the box with some charge but I highly recommend you charge it fully before using it for the first time so it doesnt die half way through a foot. If youre overwhelmed by the manual, dont worry, youre not alone. There is one Dremel tool manual that tells you practically nothing about the nail trimming aspect and is more about Dremel tool use in general. Skip that and go straight for the smaller manual that talks specifically about using it to cut your pets nails. I was very confused as to how to insert the rod that holds the sanding drum into the tool itself and couldnt find anywhere in either manual that specifically discussed how to do it because the way it comes, the hole is too small. Finally I figured out through some messing around that you hold down the blue

button on the front to lock the rod in place, then you can twist the mechanism until the hole widens enough to insert the rod and then twist to tighten again. The easiest way to do this is to get your pet to lay on their side and I HIGHLY recommend doing this outdoors.http://www.vacumatic.com.au/documents/cost-management-hilton-solution-manual.xml

Dont spend more than 3 seconds on each nail at once and dont push or it gets hot and causes irritation to the dog. Just touch the sanding drum to the nail and it will do the work for you. You dont need to push! Be patient. If your dog wont have anything to do with it on the first try, dont give up. Repeated gentle exposure and treats work wonders. Last but not least, dont be afraid of it!! If youre afraid of it, your dog will be afraid of it. There is nothing to worry about, trust me. This is such a quick and painless and safe way to cut your dogs nails. I didnt cut a single quick on my first use. This thing will really pay for itself quickly no pun intended and If I can do it, you can do it. I did NOT receive this for free or at a discount. I hope this helps someone else. This was disappointing from the getgo. Tool was always noisy, with a metallic rattly sound that sounded like it was grinding itself to death. Battery was always weak even after being fully charged it would run the tool for, at most, about 1520 minutes. Not much torque would slow down significantly while doing normal doggypaw nails. Over time, the battery would run the tool for fewer and fewer minutes, until it was under 2 minutes. I looked for replacement batteries, but brandname batteries were almost as much as a new tool. Since this Dremel 7300 was disappointing from the start, I decided to chuck the whole thing throw it out. I bought a corded WEN rotary tool as a replacement WEN 2305 Rotary Tool Kit. I didnt want another underperforming batterypowered tool that locked me into highpriced toolspecific replacement battery. For other users a cord may not be an option; for me, a cord works OK. The WEN does everything this Dremel did, only better. This Dremel left a bad taste if I didnt have other Dremels one corded and one battery powered that have performed well, I wouldnt buy another Dremel. I am putting this model down to an attempt to cash in on a name using a rebranded cheap generic tool.

Im seeing a lot of reviews where this got returned because the dog involved hated the sound. Mine did too at first, but shes starting to love it. If your dog is nervous about nail trims, this likely isnt going to be a cureall, but it is clearly way more comfortable for my dog than using clippers, and Im not worried about quicking her black nails. I built up a positive association with the dremel by breaking the process into steps dog enjoys the sound of the dremel dog accepts touching the base of the dremel to her shoulder while its on not the rotating part! dog accepts me holding her paw with dremel off dog accepts me massaging her paw and focusing on her nail with dremel off dog lets me hold her paw with dremel on dog lets me focus on nail with dremel on dog lets me touch spinning dremel to her nail for a microsecond dog lets me slowly build up time spent on each nail For each step, I used lots of treats and at first gave her a treat every time I did the action. As she got comfortable, Id take things to the next level a time or two, give her plenty of rewards, then mix it up with some of the easier levels. If she struggles or pulls away, I let her go, but she knows where the treats are and she always comes right back. Shes still not totally comfortable with me handling her paws, but she wags her tail when I get the dremel out. I only do one paw per session, with lots of breaks. Even if your dog is terrified of the dremel at first, they will likely come round if you put some time in.

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Maintaining your dogs nails is really important for their posture and joint health. If youre having trouble getting your dog used to this or understanding what youre supposed to do, there are a lot of

I did some research before buying the 765 and 7300, and ended up choosing these over other products for several reasons. Dremel 770002 MultiPro 7.2Volt 20,000 RPM TwoSpeed Rotary Tool with 50 Accessories Although this is more powerful, it is also more expensive, heavier, larger, and louder, which would make it difficult to use on my nervous pet. Dremel 76103 Cordless Pet Nail Grooming Rotary Tool This is the older version of the 765; the primary difference is that this required AA batteries. Because several people complained about having battery problems I decided to go with the updated version. I made the right choice. I have a large pitbull who has dark nails, hates having anything done to her feet, has very long quicks that are fast to bleed and slow to stop, and wiggles and refuses to stay still when she is nervous. I have tried clipping her nails, filing her nails, and even taking her on long runs on rough ground to wear them down. This is by far the best solution. I began by letting her see and smell the sander, and then running it over her body and feet with the power off. I then turned it on and held it away from her, again letting her hear, see, and smell it. I had treats at the ready, but she was fine.

I held it near her for several minutes while on, and then touched the nonsanding end to her body so that she could feel the vibration. No problems. In fact she bent down to smell it, and pinned the sanding band between her face and my hand. We both jumped, but no pain or damage to either of us. Although I was prepared to stop if she got tired or nervous, she was so good that I was able to do all four paws. The sander itself is relatively small and light, making it easy to hold even for long periods. It is easy to put together; it comes with a small wrench to put new sanding bands on. Unlike its predecessor it comes with a rechargeable battery and charger. When sanding, even on high, it is fairly guiet and vibrations are minimal. The body of the sander was warming a bit after 15 minutes, but I noticed no heat in either my dogs nails or the sanding band. In addition the battery was still going strong. My sole complaint about this product is minor; the LED light on the charger lights up to indicate a connection between the battery and the charger, but doesn't change color or go off to indicate when charging is complete. The instruction book indicates that a full charge should take approximately 3 hours, so thats what Ive gone with. I had to recharge it after about the fourth or fifth use. My only complaint is that the battery is not holding its charge nearly as well as it originally did. With one full charge I can usually get through a full sanding on all four feet, however by the end the power is running low, and I dont doubt that soon I wont be able to do all four feet at once. Apparently there is a 2 year warrenty on this sander, so I mailed in the sander, battery, and charger for them to test. I was a bit nervous about just sending it off, but about a week later they sent everything back with a new battery and its working great. Please try again later. Please try again later. 0 out of 5 stars This nail grinder is compact but fits comfortably in the hand. It had enough heft to it to feel like I could control it well but wasnt so heavy as to be tiresome. I found it fairly easy to setup and use the product, not necessarily the act of using it on the dog!. It got the job done and my dogs nails looked nicely rounded and blunt after each use. That said, there were several things I didnt care for with this product as well. First, the battery life is pretty lousy. This isnt a deal breakerit always lasted through one usebut if you forget to charge it right after for the next time it is an annoyance. Second, it seemed to have diminishing power fairly quickly. Im not sure if this was a battery issue, a mechanical problem, or what, but it seemed to grind more weakly as time went on even in the same grooming, let alone over time. My sense is that this doesnt have great longevity as a product. Finally, the sanding drums that you place on the device seem to wear out very quickly. I realize that they are comparatively small, but I still felt that they should have lasted longer,

especially for a family with a single dog and only periodic use. In the end I wouldnt say to avoid this product entirely, but I would certainly opt for a corded, directpower version instead, and I would definitely do a little comparison shopping before deciding on this product. First Ill describe my disappointment when it RAN its heavy its noisy scares both my dogs. Second, when it didnt run Id plug it into the charger and into the wall. It appeared to charge, but upon using it, within minutes it would lose power again. In the 3 years since I originally purchased this product on Amazon, I have used it only a few times. Plug it into charger and into the wall, and nothing. No light, nada.

So I call Dremel Customer service and explain the general problem Ive had with this product since the beginning and asked if based on these symptoms, it is the charger, the battery or both. The answer was disappointing too. No idea. Youd think there would be some experience with this set of problems. The cost of replacing both the charger and the battery is more than buying a new one at Walmart. She did suggest sending it into Dremel and explaining and maybe they would do something about it. Maybe the product I received was a lemon compared to all the other great reviews out there. But still, I found it way too noisy to be useful on an animal. Dang, hate wasting money. Yes, it does take longer than just cutting them, however it is worth it. I had anxiety about cutting their nails ever since a cut the guick. This relieves this fear. I am more relaxed which means the dogs are too. The vibrations are minimal as long as you hold the individual nail you are working on. It was a fast adjustment for the dogs to get used to this tool as long as you give out treats and show them it is not hurting them. My biggest tip would be to wear safety glasses though. I did get a shard kicked up into my eye and it hurt a lot and I had to flush my eye with water for awhile. Since then I do wear safety glasses and a mask because it does create some dust and I have allergies. Overall highly recommended! Please try again later. Please try again later. Nerdy Hermit 5.0 out of 5 stars I used to use normal cliptype trimmers. They were awkward to use and really took some hand power to get through my three dog's nails. I have two English Mastiffs and a Siberian Husky. Both have very thick nails. I trim the husky's nails nearly every week as they really grow fast. The Mastiffs I do once a month or sooner if needed.

This tool really makes things so much easier. The Mastiffs hated the clippers so it was very hard to keep their nails short. When I did clip, their nails were left with jagged bits that could tear skin when the boys got excited and jumped up on me. Now, their nails are short, and smooth. Note, take your time and be patient when firstusing this tool. I started out by casually grabbing the tool and walking around with it. Then I would set it down near each dog so they could sniff it. Then I would turn it on for a second so they could hear it. Eventually I would touch the tool to their nail tip while off. Then I turned it on and touched the nail. Ever so slowly I increased the time I'd touch and remove, until the digs were so used to it that they just laid their and I could do all their nails in one sitting. This must be done slowly over the course of anywhere from a few days to a few weeks depending on the dog. Also, be sure to test the nail with your finger tip while trimming. The friction of this tool will cause the nail to get really hot if you use it wrong. The best way to trim the nail is with a "touch and lift" do not press down or apply any pressure. Also, be sure to keep a clotting agent like Kwikstop just Incase you trim too far. I've never needed it, but it's always best to have some! Please try again later. Please try again later. The instructions for putting the top part to the tool isn't on the thin instructions, it's on the thicker instruction booklet with the dremel picture on page 12. I provided a video for visual help which provides better help. Second, take the dremel tool, press the blue button with one hand and the other hand turn the black collet nut counter clockwise. It'll come off, probably along with the silver collet. If the silver collet comes off just place it back in. Place the drum sander into the black collet nut and place both together into the gray collet.

Third, press down again on the blue button, and turn the black collet nut clockwise. Lastly, screw the collet as needed. PS excuse my nails lol. Hope you and your fur babies have a better experience with this than the clippers, definitely consider this. Please remember to gradually introduce your pet to this. On a small, soft cat nail it takes about 20 to 30 seconds to file the nail down on the high setting. I can have a whole paw done in that time with clippers. Cats dont have that kind of patience. LithiumIon batteries can be recharged at any time without ever damaging the original charge capacity or run time. c. Lithium ion batteries are light weight. Once the battery is charged, remove it from the charger. The run time on the battery is a little different. Different speeds mean the battery could easily run down faster on the higher speeds. Other factors that will affect the run time are going to be the force put on the tool and the overall load of the work. Under simple grinding applications, a low speed can last up to 30 minutes. On high speed, it is about half that. If carving through a piece of wood with a highspeed cutter, expect the run time to be less. Thats a tougher application and the

charge will wear down more quickly. If your battery is not accepting a charge, we would recommend sending the tool, the battery, and the charger in to us. We'll evaluate all three pieces and help resolve your problem as quickly as possible. That takes the guess work out of it. It will be minimal. Place it in the tool and let it discharge completely. Then charge it for a full 24 hours. After the full 24hour charge, place the battery in the tool and discharge it again, completely. Now recharge the battery for three hours. The battery should be fully charged. We do recommend that you always discharge the NiCd batteries completely prior to recharging and then recharge for no less than 3 hours. The light on the Lithiumion battery charger will turn off when the battery is fully charged. When the connection is broken, the light goes out. The 200Series is the entry level dual speed Dremel multitool with which you can do basic DIY and hobby craft tasks. The 300Series is the variable speed allrounder and the 4000 is the top of the line high performance multitool with which you can use for the more demanding task. If you have an older Dremel tool or an older type of attachment, it might be that you need an adapter to connect the tool and attachment. You can see here if you need an adapter. Adapters can be ordered via Dremel customer service. It has more power, improved handling and it comes with the innovative EZ Twist nose cap. We have integrated the wrench in the nose cap of the tool so you do not need a separate wrench anymore when changing accessories. However, attachment models 212, 231 and 330 need a universal adapter which is available free from Dremel Customer service, 18004373635. The MultiSaw has a reciprocating action using any jigsaw blade on the market. These two attachments can ONLY be used on the Dremel 4000, 400 Series and 8200 rotary tools which offer the enhanced performance necessary to use the attachments effectively. The collet, a slim aluminum tube with small slots, holds the shank portion of the accessory and will be tightened inside the collet when you tighten the black collet nut on the end of the 300 Series rotary tool's output shaft. Use the wrench, provided in your 300 Series rotary tool kit, if you cannot firmly tighten with your fingers. For harder work load applications i.e. routing, tile cutting, etc.

please always use the wrench to assure proper tightening. They are considered maintenancefree parts. We do recommend taking compressed air to blow air through the front and rear air vents to get rid of any excess dust build up inside your 300 series tool. The motor brushes are located in the brush holder, under the brush doors on each side of the tool. The brushes should be checked every 50 hours of tool use. This will seat the new motor brushes. The best results generally happen when taking a less aggressive, more frequent pass. Too much pressure on the spinning accessory and the work piece can damage the accessory and the work piece. If the accessory is not producing the desired result, we would recommend adjusting the speed, or trying an alternative accessory. The only results you will get are stripped screw heads. It's better to use a cordless screw driver or the "old fashioned" hand screw driver. Reversing the direction of the rotary tool will make most of the accessories "in effective". Therefore, you only need to plug your rotary tool into a standard outlet or with an approved extension cord. Please consult your 300 Series Owners Safety and Operations Manual for further information. The 8000 and 8200 both have 10.8 volt rechargeable LithiumIon battery packs. The advantage of LithiumIon batteries is that they keep their electrical charge much longer and they do not have the so called "memory effect", so you can charge the battery whenever you want. However, because the motor of the 8200 is bigger and the electronics are a bit more clever, the performance of the 8200 is higher than the 8000. Roughly, the allround performance of the 8000 is the cordless equivalent of the corded Dremel 300Series and the high performance 8200

is the equivalent of the corded Dremel 4000. We do recommend that for the Dremel 7700 you run the battery down prior to recharge. This way the battery keeps in optimal condition.

The runtime of a cordless tool depends on the battery type NiCd or LithiumIon, the type of application e.g. light polishing or heavy cutting and the tool model Stylus, 8000 or 7700. We have designed our tools in such a way that the average battery life of each tool is matched with the most frequent type of applications for each model. SpeedClic assortment Your Dremel tool will have been supplied with the 3,2mm collet. If you purchase an accessory with a smaller shank you need to also purchase the proper collet size. The collets can be purchased as a set including all collet sizes or as individual collets. Multichuck If you have the Multichuck 4486 you don't need to use collets, the multichuck fits all Genuine Dremel accessories with shank sizes from 0,4 up to 3,4mm. It works like a regular drill chuck and you don't need to tighten it more than hand tight. When the chuck cap is threaded onto the end of the tool, over the collet, the fingers of the collet slots close around the shank of the accessory and hold it into place. When should I start checking on themLet the speed of the tool do the work. Forcing the tool does a couple of things; it forces the bit into more material than can be processed adequately and it creates even more heat than simply letting the tool move the accessory through the wood. Guide the tool through the design and work. Watch the depth. While forcing the tool may cause the accessory to burn, going too deep into the wood will not only cause the accessory to burn, it will smoke the wood as well. It is better to take a second conservative pass than it is to take so much that the accessory burns. It is often difficult to know what an accessory tolerance is, as it is impossible to know what the density and grain of a wood will be.

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
