The unit can now read Staplesbrand DVDR 8X disks, which I had on hand at home for use in my computers DVD burner. I havent tried other brands of 8X yet, because my current Staples spindle is a 100pack, but I see no reason to think that other quality brands wont work. I generally use the 8hour speed to cram four movies on one disk, and the results are still superior to VHS. Perhaps Im doing it wrong, but I read the manual and it did not mention using the remote controls numeric buttons to set the time. If not for the problems listed above, I would give this model five stars. This unit has done an excellent job at the tasks for which I needed it VHS to DVD transfer, and DVD recording. Yeah, a large hard drive would be nice, but you wont find a hard drive and VHS capability in any model at this price. Besides, with the cost of blank disks approaching 20 cents each, you can afford to make some mistakes and toss out recordings that you dont like. I chose it over the similarly priced Panasonic DMRE75VS primarily because this one records on DVDRW, which can be read on any computer or DVD player, unlike DVDRAM. I was concerned about the image quality issue other customers have mentioned. So one of the first things I did was a comparison test. And THEN I spent several minutes swapping the recorded DVDs in and out of the DVD player and playing the same segments over again for comparison. The result of the test was disappointing. The DVR90VEs conversion has subtle problems. Basically the horizontal sync and color reproduction are unstable. The image is slightly wobbly and scintillating. Mind you though, this is in fact very subtle, and I might not have noticed had I not done a sidebyside test and had I not been looking for it based on other reviews here. There were some positive surprises. I had no problems with media compatibility whatsoever. The DVD recorder itself, when recording direct from cable, is excelent. The LP speed starts showing subtle artifacts, if you know how to recognize MPEG compression artifacts, around subtitles and rolling tickers. I also tried the SEP speed and found it acceptable for watchonce stuff, but not for a longterm collection recording. The manual is on par

I was hoping that by bypassing analog cables, with the internal VCRtoDVR link, I would get a better quality conversion than I get with my VCRcamcorderPC arrangement. Based on reviews here, the Panasonic may not be any better. So I'm considering exchanging the unit for a pure DVD recorder, with no VCR. I bought my unit from Amazon so I hope I can get that upgrade disc. Amazing these companies are not looking further forward. Bad as computers, always got to have updates!! Last night I tried doing a timer recorder from the TV on Andre Rieux. I finalized an Office Depot DVDRW disc and played it back on the TV where I had recorded it and it worked great. Then I tried to play it in my Panasonic Home Theater DVD player, and it kept telling me that it could not accept the disc. Overall though I think it is a wonderful machine. Before you call, be sure to have model and serial numbers ready and to be in front of an operating machine with remote switch in hand. Despite the complaints of some previous reviewers, Ive found the quality of playback to be first rate. The VCR, in fact, is clearer and less jumpy than a newly acquired Sony. Id give the unit 5 stars were it not for some glitches in the instructions and lack of warnings concerning the use of 8X disks. Heed the onestar reviews use only 4X not 8X DVDR blank disks. TDK, Memorex, and SONY have all proved to be reliable. Avoid Trex and Verbatim. 2. DVDRW Dont bother. Editing options are limited, and DVDRW disks are incompatible with most other players. 3. Quick fix should the DVD drive lock up and the drawer refuse to open e.g., when a faulty blank disk gets locked into formatting mode, simply unplug the unit, wait about an hour, and try again with a fresh disk, of course. I cant tell you why, but it works for me. 4. Can you convert copyprotected VHS tapes to DVD. According to the owners manual, no. According to the laws in most countries, no. But in practice, yes about 80% of the time. No tricks, no hacks apparently just happenstance. 5. Can you convert your homemade VHS tapes to DVD. 0 out of 5 stars Were it not for media incompatibility and the lame customer support for this issue, I would give the unit 5 stars. These problems appear to be the fault of the original firmware in the machine, which only allows DVDR 14x and DVDRW 12x media to be used for recording. The only information available there is a PDF of the users manual which is also not helpful regarding this issue, since it does not stress in any way that the rated speed of the media is critical. There are no media compatibility FAQ pages or firmware update notices, and typing in the machine model DVR90VE gets you nothing. This website is a waste of time outside of contacting them by email. I emailed them an inquiry and got a response 4 days later advising me to call the customer service number regarding the firmware update, which is supposedly operational 7 days a week. I had tried calling them a few times earlier in the year when I encountered the media compatibility problem,

but was never able to reach anyone. This is also clearly a waste of time. It seems to work my unit will now accept 8x DVDRs, although still only 12x DVDRWs. Why they have not done so long before this is a complete mystery to me, but I think it reflects badly on the company or at least its US division and certainly does not inspire great confidence in their other products. But this dvd recorder stopped working. I tried early on to give disks it could burn without trouble TDK, Memorex, Verbatim. Some other brands would not work. Then a couple months ago, every disk I tried would not be recognized by the DVDR90VE. No dvd writing at all, just the dreaded E25 error. Theyve fixed things for me before; theyre pretty good. They said it couldnt be fixed and called it cheap.

Though Ive owned this machine a long time, Ive made perhaps 20 dvds with it. So it was not a good purchase as a dvd recorder. Look for a better brand. I have an LG I like now. Not a combo unit, it handles just dvds. After I burn 25 or 50 disks, Ill let you know how it holds up. Maybe dvd recorders are temperamental devices and after a while, they stop working. I was recording my first tape in 20 minutes from the time I started to open the box. It worked flawlessly the first time, but you need to read the page that tells you how to finalize the disk so you can play it on your other DVDs. The manual is easy to read. I havent tried to do any editing. I would have to read the manual. What editing is available is limited. I have not had any problems using DVDRW. I bought the cheapest Office Depot brand and I use them daily to record TV programs during the day using the timer recording. Ive recorded about a dozen old tapes that Ive purchased over the years only one gave me a copy protection error and wouldnt record. I tried it again using a DVDRW disk and it appears to be recording at this minute, but I havent tried to view it. I bought my unit at Amazon and Im very pleased. Im pleased with the Amazon and the product. I just wish it was in black to match the rest of my components. Ive found they do make it in black but it wasnt an option at Amazon. I moved it upstairs because it didnt match my other equipment and couldnt replace them and have the look I wanted. It worked out well. I do as much recording as I want and then just move the completed disks to my expensive stuff downstairs. The disk it records are better than the capture card and expensive software I originally bought to do what it does. Plus I can record TV on DVDRW.

If you want an inexpensive way to save some space and get rid of those old tapes this is terrific. If you look at it up close it looks like a value unit, and in my opinion it is one of the best values you can get. The tuner is better than my 2 year old much more expensive equipment. The quality when playing back tapes or DVDs is excellent. I gave this device 4 stars because it isnt perfect for all tasks, but if you want value it is a 6. Here is all you need to do get your remote and press the CM Skip key followed by the 6, 5, and 4 keys in quick succession. The DVD tray will open. Insert the upgrade disc and close the tray. The upgrade will start automatically and completes in about 45 seconds. Thats it. I was on hold for over 40 minutes with Funai to find this out. They should just include the instructions with the disc. With the upgrade, this unit matches up with any others out there. If youre looking for a good deal that offers quality results, basic features, versatility, and is easy to set up and use, save your time and buy the Sylvania DVR 90VE. I was recording DVDs 20 minutes after opening the box. The onetouch recording to VHS and DVD as well as dubbing from VHS to DVD could not be simpler. Ive recorded to over 100 discs so far with no problems. All finalized discs have worked on other players. DVD recording quality is very good to excellent. I use the Sylvania in tandem with a DVR to transfer recordings I want to keep to DVD. There is no loss of quality in the transfer when using the 2 hour mode. There is a very small drop

when using the four hour mode but it still produces a very good picture.

The 6 hour mode produces basic VHS quality images and 8 and 10 hour mode are also available. The same applies when dubbing tapes to DVD. The recording quality is as good as the source material when using the 2 hour mode. The tuner provides a clear, crisp picture with very good contrast. I don't use advanced editing features so I can't compare how the Sylvania stacks up in that regard. However, it is very easy to title disc menus and chapters. Unwanted segments can be edited out in all but the dubbing mode using the pause button while recording. I was pleasantly surprised with the quality and versatility of this recorder. If you're looking for a no frills all-in-one machine that can be used for basic everyday viewing and recording, with the added bonus of tape to DVD dubbing, I would highly recommend this unit. As another review noted, the Emerson EWR20VR sold at WalMart is the same machine, as is the Sylvania SRDV495 sold at Sears. All are made by Funai corporation. Please try again later. I'm a little disappointed in the remote. The button layout on the remote is quirky and I find myself staring at it to figure out how to do certain functions. Switching from dvd to vhs and back is not a smooth operation as many universal remotes are not fully aware of the sylvania dvr90ve combo so I find myself digging for the remote that came with the unit just to switch modes and I can then go back to using the universal remote typically the comcast one. The clock auto-sets. Setting the unit to timer record is a bit quirky as well. Overall, I give this unit high marks for a modest cost unit that performs well but I had to knock off a few points for the quirky remote. Another area that is a little quirky is the long load time for the disk menu. It seems like an excessive wait before I am able to cancel out of the previews and get to the title I paid to watch. Often the wait time just to load the disk menu seems long. One nice feature is the ability to listen to mp3 music. I haven't yet burned an mp3 dvd, but I expect this to work fine. This would make my dvd player able to hold more than a 4 gig ipod nano. I'll also try recording a double-layer disk and edit this review later.

9 gig would probably hold my entire music collection. Of course you must have the tv on to navigate songs and folders. This is why we bought the unit, to convert our older home movies from various older formats to dvd. The DVD recorder is a bit finicky only records DVDRW format and especially 12X speed. Unfortunately, I found out the hard way after purchasing DVDRs and even some higher speed DVDRWs that didn't read properly. It is nice to be able to record 2 hours worth of programming on one DVDRW though. I don't use the remote that much, so I don't really have an issue there. Sylvania is great! I had owned one of these machines in the past and mine had finally died on
