They made chrome ETR and ETRS bodies and chrome 120, 220, and 70mm backs probably until 1981 when they switched from metal body panels to polycarbonate. Their previous cameras used focal plane shutters, with Nikon manufacturing the optics. After losing Nikon as a partner, Bronica initially tried to contract out manufacturing of lenses to Tokyo Kogaku, Carl Zeiss Jena and other companies, but decided to begin designing and producing their own optics. Their main competing camera at the time was the Mamiya M645. Since it's a leaf shutter based camera, flash sync is available at all speeds.

Changeable holders make the system more flexible compared to the original M645. After the shutter is fired and a frame is exposed rotating the film advance lever one rotation resets the mirror, advances the film and cocks the shutter. The ETR series adopted some of the dark slide features of previous models. The camera will release the back when the dark slide is inserted and the release button on the body is pressed. The shutter cannot be released with the dark slide inserted. Unlike the older Bronica models, when the back is detached from the body the dark slide can still be removed from the film holder. The lens cannot be removed or attached without cocking the shutter. Observe the cocking pin colour is green on the lens and body before attaching the lens. This is because the mirror does not automatically return and has to move out of the way. The camera is powered by a 6v PX28A battery with a battery check feature also available. While midroll film format changes are not possible, end of roll changes are just as quick with additional inserts. The naming of this model is similar to the original Bronica 6x6 series where the Bronica C did not have interchangeable backs. The main improvement is the interchangeable viewfinder system. The newer AE II and III finders are not fully compatible with the older ETR cameras, because there is a new electronic connector pin. The shutter button lock has been redesigned. It has three settings, unlocked, shutter release button lock but drive and cable release unlocked, and all locked. The neck strap mount has been changed to a design with an eyelet while the previous one was a spring catch style mount used on the Bronica 6x6s, along with many Hasselblads and Kievs. Not to be confused with the Bronica ETRC. The specifications of the camera remain unchanged. The lens release design has changed from a circular style to a rectangular one, it has also changed location from the front of the body to the side.

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This redesign makes removing lenses easier, pulling on the switch and rotating the lens to release instead of rotating and pressing the lens release as well as rotating the lens. The roll film holders have been changed to a two release tab system. It has a number of new and improved features. New features include mirror lockup switch located near the film winding crank. TTL flash metering with OTF flash exposure feature. TTL automatic flash requires the use of the SCA connector located on the shutter side of the body for attachment to a SCA flash adapters. When multiple exposure mode is enabled, the right of the viewfinder now displays a red indicator. A traditional bulb mode shutter setting is available instead of just T, but it consumes power while in use. The film advance gearing mechanism has been improved. The lower half of the body has improved grip areas. The lens release has returned to the front of the camera. The film back holder EI has been improved with locking dark slide system similar to the older 6x6 Bronicas. The new locking dark slides have a grey handle. The winder on the back insert has changed from a thumb style to a flip out crank style. All the backs have a film reminder tab holder, insert release latch and a darkslide system. The first versions have a single top release latch with a leatherette patch. Later versions are similar but the leather changed to an arrow marking. The final version has the locking dark slides and dual release latches with triangular arrow markings. The original winders feature a large halfcircular flip up crank while other versions have smaller cranks, and one version does not have a crank at all, but a more basic winding knob. 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This odd combination of colors might seem unusual, but all of them look good and work well together with the other standard black components. This was different from the original ones in several ways. First the originals came with chrome winding cranks, while the Chrome ETRSi came with a standard black crank. Second the original 120 backs had chrome shells and inserts, while the 1996 chrome backs were black painted shells with chrome inserts. Bring your answer sheet with you to the test, which should take approximately 30-45 minutes. Remove the film holder. Insert right end of film onto the right side shaft. Close the little trap door the left side shaft and the film spool should be engaged. Readjust it and try again. You will feel resistance as the crank begins the wind; don't

panic, that's the shutter being cocked. These pairs indicate the distance that will be in focus at these lens openings. If the red dot is lined up with the red L, the shutter is locked; rotate counter clockwise to unlock. The red LED light will light up when you depress the release and the camera is loaded to indicate an exposure has been made. The LED will not light if the shutter release is locked. Film is not advanced or between "S" and "1". Shutter is not cocked. Lens release button is depressed. All frames have been exposed i.e., 12 for 120. The shutter blades will close, underexposing the film if the winding crank is accidentally rotated before the exposure is completed, as in the case of a slow shutter speed setting. Do not twist; straight in straight out. Then, open the back cover and take out the film holder. Remove the takeup spool from the film holder while holding the exposed film so that it will not unwind. Seal the exposed film. Indicates battery is OK. It will lock in that position and the shutter can be cocked any number of times without the film advancing. Don't forget to return the lever to its 12 o'clock position when your multiple exposure is finished.

It has 3 settings; N normal—for shooting without locking up the mirror, S single frame or C continuous—for shooting with the mirror locked up. Rotate the lockup lever in a counter clockwise direction and line up N, S, or C with the dot. The lens shutter will close completely and the mirror will swing up. After focusing in the normal manner, reset the distance to the red index line by shifting the distance ring. This will retain focus of the longer infrared rays. They are very similar except for a few things. For example the lens release buttons are all in a slightly different place, they have different finders, and the exposures are different sizes. I once bought a used ETRSi roll film back, and the pin which senses film advance would not get actuated properly. Interesting that 120 back is ok on camera at least on only 120 film I exposed all frames were exposed properly. Is it only 135W back that needs adjustment, or body and back must be adjusted together. I loved idea to have 35mm panoramic back coupled with 40mm PE lens. 135W back to camera interface looks identical to one of my 120 back 2 pins, that's it. Now I remember that I fitted Leaf digital back with Kapture group adapter on exactly this camera for a few shots, combo worked well. So it must be 135W back that needs adjustment. Just grinding down the pin a bit at a time seems like it might fix the problem, but you might not know if grinding it too short renders the back inoperable by doing so! I would love to have a digital back for that! I finally will bring 135W back to the local Bronica equipment importer, will see whether they can cope with this problem. They come in handy with a bit of colour film in them. Usually I have Ilford FP4 or HP5 in one 645 back and Rollei Infrared in another.
